# **2024: Making a Difference Together**Library Partners to Promote Learning & Literacy

2024 was another year of collaboration and outreach for Merrickville Library. The Library Board is pleased to report that almost all use metrics grew in 2024. User visits, programs, class visits, meetings, and computer use all continued their upward trend, although there was a dip in circulation and interlibrary loans. The Board is happy to see that the Library is providing Merrickville-Wolford and Montague with services that residents value.

Collaborating with local groups lets the Library offer more learning, wellness, and social engagement activities to the community (*p* 4-5), work together on impactful projects (*p* 2-3), and improve collections and services (*p* 6-7).

In 2024, this resulted in more programming for seniors — including a popular smartphone course, in addition to *Fitness for Your Aging Brain (p 4)*. Partnering also allowed us to add a new adult French language collection *(p 7)* to better serve our Francophone population.

The Library also joined a partnership to create Eco-Literacy Centers for Kids in local libraries, and has done more outreach to the schools to promote class visits to and from the Library (p 3). And, of course, we continue to work with

our partners on the Seed Library, Story Trail, and Eco-Champions Contest; host groups and meetings, and contribute to community events (*p* 2-3). In addition to providing more opportunities for our users, the Library is able to support the goals of our community partners through these collaborations.

The Library appreciates all of the support we receive from the community. **Park View Homes** very generously rebuilt the Library's porch in 2024. The support of the **Friends of the Library** and other donors (*p* 6-7) provides funding for eresources, programs and collections — adding non-fiction, indigenous, graphic novels, and 'Romantasy' this year.


# **Seed Library**

In 2024, we added new books on wetlands and a very popular visit with local environmentalist Andrea Howard (Merrickville's Bug Lady) during the summer. We look forward to additional Eco-Literacy programs in 2025.

# Class Visits



The Library continued to welcome regular class visits from École Ste-Marguerite-Bourgeovs. These were on hiatus in the fall due to school staffing, but we look forward to them resuming in 2025.

Librarian visits to Merrickville School expanded from seasonal to bi-weekly this year, and increased visits to Montague School are planned for 2025. These visits

raise the Library's profile with students. Mary Kate also does regular story visits to the local daycare and playgroup. (See stats, p 4)

# A Place to Meet



Community Groups made frequent use of the Library's meeting room in 2024. These included the Knitting Club, the Agricultural Fair Board, Chamber of Commerce, Theatre Night In Merrickville, Soccer Club, Run Merrickville, Scouting leaders, the Friends of the Library & more. Remote meeting space is available via the Library's Zoom account.

# Library Programs Entertain, Educate & Engage

Library programs **promote community well-being!** They support life-long learning and social interaction enabling people to become more engaged in their interests and the community. Programs increase library use by families and kids, promoting literacy and learning through play.

The Library offered more programs in 2024, and saw an increase in attendance. There were more programs for seniors, including a smartphone course (in partnership with the **Adult Learning & Training Centre**) and an Anti-Fraud seminar by the **OPP**, in addition to several sessions of the *Fitness for Your Aging Brain* program.

Of course, the Library also offers literary programs such as Off The

Shelf, a monthly pro-

# The Library is for All Ages

The Library offers a variety of programs for kids. These include literacy-based programs:

- a weekly StoryTime to develop preliteracy and school readiness skills through stories, songs, rhythm instruments & crafts
- a French language StoryTime offered during the 2023-2024 school year in partnership with École Ste-Marguerite-Bourgeoys and the school board (CECCE)
- the TD Summer Reading Club for school-aged kids.

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math) was another focus of our youth programming in 2024, and the theme of our March Break activities. Summer programs focused on space and ecology, and included a kids' Chess Club (led by William & James).

Arts activities included music programs for preschool & primary students led by **Anya Perry (Maple Music Studios)** and by **James Clugston**; and an **Art4Youth** painting workshop by local artist **David Brent** for teens & tweens. Thank you to our local artists and musicians for volunteering their time to lead these programs.

The TD Summer Reading Club combines our very popular Prize Draw (kids earn tickets by reading books) with weekly activities. This year's theme was "To The Stars" and included space-themed STEAM activities—including making egg landing capsules, marble runs, light-up solar systems, bottle rockets, plus a drone presentation (thank you Marc Bergeron).

Reading programs help keep up literacy skills and prevent summer learning loss. Youth circulation nearly doubles during the summer. We were pleased to have **over 100 kids** in our target 6-12 age group in 2024. We look forward to new literacy support programming with the **Lions Club** in 2025.


The Friends contributed over \$6,000 to the Library in 2024 to update the adult nonfiction collection, as well as sponsoring our ebook collection, film streaming






